#### **Context**

W.K.Kellogg Family Engagement and Equity Grant Tulsa Area Community Schools Initiative Resource Center Sprouts Child Development Initiative, Conexiones, and Community School Coordinators in both TPS and Union

Out of the 1,200 applicants
Center for Community Schools Stategies was one of 30 initiatives whom were awarded
3 year grant





### Systemic Barriers: Anti Immigrant Law and 3<sup>rd</sup> Grade Reading Test

In 2007, HB 1804 passed which was one of the restrictive anti immigrant laws at the time.

Reading Sufficiency Act required all 3<sup>rd</sup> graders to be tested for reading levels, if not proficient then were held back if they did not qualify for the 6 exemptions.

### **Power of Families Project Goal**

The Power of Families Project will expand the capacity of Tulsa-area family, friend and neighborhood care environments to provide successful equitable early childhood experiences for children who are not able to access formal early childhood programs and/or whose first language is not English.

### **Demographic Data**


With the exception of two respondents, the surveys were completed by the biological mother of child participating in PFP

Average age of our respondents was 32 years old - Ranging from 17 years old - 51 years old

- 100% of our respondents are Hispanic/Latino
  - Mexico being the highest reported country of birth (87%)
  - Guatemala (11%)
  - Honduras, El Salvador, United States (2%)




### Marital Status and Family Structure



89% of the respondents stated that the biological father of the child under 5 years old lived in the same household



### **Education Level Completed of Caregivers**



### Children

- •426 total children under the age of 18 years old
- •210 children 5 years or younger
- •177 children (under the age of 5 years) were reported to not be attending any formal early childcare facility (82%)
- •12% of Respondents were pregnant at the time of taking the survey





# **Employment**

63% of respondents said that they were not working


Of the 36% that do work

- 97% that they worked one job
- Average 28 hours a week

During the last four weeks how often have you felt unmotivated and depressed?






# **Medical History**

Respondents reported that a doctor has them that they suffer from:

- 9% Diabetes
- 8% High Blood Pressure
- 12% High Cholesterol
- 30% Overweight/Obesity



# **Groups and Networks**





### Groups and Networks

Do you wish to participate in more groups or organizations? 83% responded yes

What are the biggest barriers that inhibit you from participating more in groups or community activities?

Lack of Time
Childcare
Lack of Awareness
Transportation



### **Networks**

On average respondents had 3 friends that they felt comfortable with, could talk about private issues with, or ask for help

15% said they had no one



If you suddenly needed a small amount of money that is about what you earn on a weekly basis how many people, beyond your immediate family would be available to loan you this money?

27% No one54% One or Two people19% Three or more

If so, are a majority of the people of a similar/higher/lower economic level?

Lower: 4%

Similar:72%

Higher: 24%



# **Trust and Solidarity**

86% of respondents stated that generally they had to be very careful in their relationships with others

14% stated that a majority of people could be trusted

48% of respondents felt that they could be taken advantaged of by someone in their neighborhood



# How much do you trust in the following types of people:

Whites	9%	50%	41%
Blacks	2%	37%	61%
Police	3%	41%	56%
Nurses and Doctors	49%	39%	12%

# **Collective Action and Cooperation**

When asked if they would contribute time to a community project that would not directly benefit them but would benefit others in the community, respondents stated:

Yes: 89%

No: 17%

What about contributing money?

Yes: 79%

No: 21%

But when asked if they had worked with others in the community to do something that benefitted the community in the past year, 92% responded that they had not.

### **Information and Communication**

Do you have access to Internet? Yes: 50.33%

93% of respondents had internet access on their cell phone

76% of respondents watch television every day



# Most popular sources of information on political changes, community events, job opportunities...

Television

Radio = Facebook

Internet

Family, Friends, and neighbors



### **Social Cohesion and Inclusion**

- •66% perceived that they could not participate school/education
- •70% perceived that they did not have access to healthy food
- •67% perceived that they did not have access protection from police
- •72% perceived that they did not have access social services/clinics
- •72% perceived that they did not have access to affordable housing

# Is there a community activity in which you perceive that you are not allowed to participate in?

71% responded yes

Some responses included:

My child's classroom

School activities

Employment

Volunteering in the community

Voting

Travel



#### Name Two Reasons

Language Spoken – 67% Immigration status -57% Lack of Education -17% Race or Ethnicity-10%



### **Conflict and Violence**

17% of respondents had experienced a violent crime, such as assault

12% had experienced their house being robbed or property damage



# **Empowerment and Political Action**

10% of our families are eligible to vote 3% have registered to vote Last time voted: 2003




# Out of the 211 ASQ-3's that the Power of Families has completed, 64% (135) were noted as a concern:

Of the 64% noted as a concern, communication and problem-solving skills were ranked highest as key problem areas:

- Highest percentage of (14%) monitoring scores were noted in communication
- Highest percentage (10%) of below cut-off scores were noted in problem-solving \*Both require further consultation and/or evaluation partnership with Sprouts Child Development

### **Building Trust within the Community**

Trust between the promotoras and vulnerable Hispanic /Latino communities hinges upon the physical presence of the promotoras in the communities.

The genuine empathy that promotoras translates into trust regarding issues, such as health and education.

The promotoras also earn this trust through their positive role modeling that is often transmitted by word of mouth among members of vulnerable

Hispanic /Latino communities.
